Why do I need to learn this?

Most of us will rely on cars at some point in our lives. It is important to know how to maintain and repair these cars. "We should strive to become self-reliant and not depend on others for our existence." (Marion G. Romney, Ensign, Mar 2009, 61–65)

You will need to know how and when to maintain your car or your car will break down more often. Lack of car maintenance can cause more serious and expensive car problems in the future.

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A Guide to Independence

"A Guide to Independence" lists the major skills that I want my children to learn before they leave home. Feel free to tailor the guidelines to your own individual family.

Each page is divided into general categories (cooking, cleaning, ironing, etc.) and contain five to seven requirements that your child must complete to pass off each skill. The first requirements are usually the easiest and they progressively become more difficult. When printed, these pages are in a format that can easily be converted into a book.

These requirements are meant to be done over a child's entire life at home. Although "A Guide to Independence" may be started at anytime, there are certain requirements that may only be completed when a child is older. You may want to provide a reward for completing all of the requirements and smaller rewards along the way.

Parents will NEED to help children with these requirements to ensure that children have properly learned the skills. This will also create priceless memories for children and parents as they work together. Once requirements have been passed off, encourage children to use the skills they've learned on a regular basis. Practice makes perfect.

My children are still young, but my hope is that they will continue to enjoy becoming independent and that they will acquire the basic skills necessary to be successful in life.

Ironing

Why do I need to learn this?

How you dress affects how others perceive you. "Our clothing is ... the "landscaping" for presenting our bodies as temples. Just as the temple grounds portray the sacredness and reverence for what takes place inside the temple, our clothing portrays the beauty and purity of our inner selves." (Robert D. Hales, Aug. 2008 Ensign)

You will need to iron clothes to wear to church, the temple, work, a mission, special events, and on many other occasions.


Sewing can not only save money, but can help you save a favorite outfit in need of repair, mend a rip, tear, or fallen button at the last minute, and provide modest options for your clothing.

Cooking not only saves money, but provides a healthy diet and good food for yourself and family.




You will cook breakfast, lunch, dinner, holiday meals, potluck dinners, desserts, food for yourself, your family, your friends, on your mission, etc.


Even if others are cooking for us we should offer our help and thanks.

When you have a clean home, your mind will also be more uncluttered and able to receive revelation. The atmosphere surrounding us greatly affects our state of mind. Keep your house clean and invite the Spirit in.

During warm months lawn work will need to be done every week and sometimes even daily.

Many have allowed themselves to be diverted and have become ... addicts to mental and spiritual indolence and to the pursuit of worldly pleasure." (Teachings of Presidents of the Church: Spencer W. Kimball [2006], 4–5).

Taking care of the yard is not only fulfilling a responsibility, but the end result will give us greater satisfaction and teach us principles of God.




